Youth confirmation resumes on Sunday September 12 at 3pm (the time for classes) with a meeting and brief introduction to Luther's Small Catechism. This class is geared towards those of middle school age (often grades 7-8). It is a two-year course which journeys through the Catechism materials twice. Projects, sermon notes, and other expectations will be discussed at the meeting. Adult Inquirers, also called new members class, will begin on Saturday, September 18 at 6:15pm. This class is geared towards adults who wish to be confirmed into membership at Trinity or those wanting to refresh their memory. Each class is scheduled to last one hour and includes 10-12 sessions depending on discussion and need. If you are interested, or you know of someone who may be interested, please call the office or send me an email.

Sunday morning Bible study is connected to the Augsburg Confession. "The Augsburg Confession, also known as the Augustan Confession or the Augustana from its Latin name, Confessio Augustana, is the primary confession of faith of the Lutheran Church and one of the most important documents of the Protestant Reformation." Having only begun with an introduction on Sunday August 29, it is a great time to jump in.

I will also be announcing a daytime study in the next few weeks. I anticipate this class will meet on Wednesdays, but feel free to make a pitch for another day and suitable time.

Finally, I would like to make myself available for home, hospital, and other visits. Please do not hesitate to reach out to me, and I will do my best to pray for, consult, and care for you as the Lord wills.

# A Note from the Deacon

Rev. Dr. Jerry Kieschnick, former President of the LCMS has a blog entitled "**PERSPECTIVES - Thoughts from Dr.** Jerry Kieschnick on Life in Christ." You can sign up to get his blog, which he puts it out randomly. In one of his most recent blogs, dated August 5, 2021 he writes about taxes, something we all love! The blog for June 3, 2021 caught my eye, it was entitled "Sparky Was a Looser." I enjoyed it and I learned something from it. I hope you will too!

When he was a little boy, his uncle called him "Sparky" after a comic strip horse named Spark Plug. School was all but impossible for Sparky. He failed every subject in eighth grade. He flunked Physics, Latin, Algebra, and English in high school.

His record in sports wasn't any better. Though he did manage to make the school's golf team, he promptly lost the only important match of the season. There was a consolation match. He lost that too.

Throughout his youth Sparky was socially awkward. It wasn't that the other students disliked him. It's just that no one really cared that much.

Sparky was a loser. He knew it. His classmates knew it. Everybody knew it. So he learned to live with it. He made up his mind early that if things were meant to work out, they would. Otherwise, he would content himself with what appeared to be his inescapable mediocrity.

One thing was important to Sparky. Drawing. He was proud of his artwork. In his senior year of high school, he submitted some cartoons to the yearbook. His editors rejected his efforts. Despite this brushoff, Sparky was convinced of his ability. He decided to become an artist.

After high school, Sparky wrote Walt Disney Studios. They asked for a sample of his artwork. Despite careful preparation, it was also rejected. One more confirmation that he was a loser.

But Sparky still didn't give up. Instead, he decided to tell his own life's story in cartoons. The main character would be a little boy who symbolizes the perpetual loser and chronic underachiever. It was what he knew best.

Sparky's cartoon character went on to become a cultural phenomenon of all sorts. People readily identified with this "lovable loser." He reminded people of the painful and embarrassing moments from their own past, of their pain and their shared humanity.



The character soon became famous: "Charlie Brown." And Sparky, the boy whose many failures never kept him from trying, whose work was rejected again and again, became the highly successful cartoonist, Charles Schultz. He was born Nov. 26, 1922 and died Feb. 12, 2000.

His cartoon strip "Peanuts" continues to inspire books, T-shirts, and Christmas specials, reminding us that life somehow finds a way for all of us, even the losers, to succeed.

The Bible is full of stories of people who suffered failure and disappointment: Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel, Noah and his sons, Abraham and Sarah, Jacob and Esau, Joseph and his brothers, Samson and Delilah, David and Bathsheba, and many others.

Yet in each story, God's purpose was accomplished. The same is true of your story and of mine.

We all face difficulty and discouragement from time to time. I surely have. But we also have a choice in how we handle it. If we're persistent, hold fast to our faith, discover and develop our unique talents, and trust God's plan for our lives, there is no limit to our potential.

In the end, there are very few "losers." Some winners just take longer to develop. Charles Monroe "Sparky" Schultz learned that truth about life.

His story is encouraging. It was to me. And maybe to you as well.

What is God's purpose for your life? Hope you find your unique talents and put them to use them for God's purpose.

#### FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST (Proper 18B)

(5 September 2021) Isaiah 35:4-7a James 2:1-10, 14-18 Mark 7:(24-30) 31-37

Our Merciful Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Does All Things Well

The Lord proclaims the Gospel "to those who have an anxious heart" to comfort and encourage them with His presence. He comes not only with threats of "vengeance" and "recompense," but with His gracious salvation (Is. 35:4). He opens "the eyes of the blind" and "the ears of the deaf," and He loosens "the tongue of the mute" to "sing for joy" (Is. 35:5–6). Like water on thirsty ground, He speaks His life-giving Word to people of all nations. With His Word and the touch of His hand, He does "all things well," so that you may now speak "plainly" (Mark 7:31–37). You confess the truth of God in Christ to the glory of His holy name, and you call upon His name in every trouble, confident that He will hear and answer. As you pray and confess with your tongue, so also "love your neighbor as yourself" (James 2:8). Show your faith "in our Lord Jesus Christ, the Lord of glory," by loving without partiality. For God has "chosen those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom" (James 2:1–5).

#### SIXTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST (Proper 19B)

(12 September 2021) Isaiah 50:4–10 James 3:1–12 Mark 9:14–29 Christ Jesus Delivers Us from Sin, Death and the Devil

Those who teach the Word of God "will be judged with greater strictness" (James 3:1) because it is by the Word that saving faith is obtained, whereas false doctrine always threatens to destroy Christian faith and life. The tongue "boasts of great things," whether for good or evil (James 3:5). In fallen man, "it is a restless evil, full of deadly poison" (James 3:8). But anyone who bridles his tongue with the Word of God, who "does not stumble in what he says, he is a perfect man" (James 3:2). It is Christ who opens His ear to the voice of His Father, so that, with "the tongue of those who are taught," He is able to sustain the weary "with a word" (Is. 50:4–5). Entrusting Himself to His Father, even to death, He is not put to shame but is vindicated in His resurrection (Is. 50:6–9). By His faith and faithfulness, He casts out the "mute and deaf spirit" from us (Mark 9:25). He has compassion on us and helps us, so that we are not destroyed but cleansed from every evil and raised up from death to life (Mark 9:22–27).

#### SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST (Proper 20B)

(19 September 2021) Jeremiah 11:18-20 James 3:13-4:10 Mark 9:30-37

Our Father Cares for His Children with the Gospel of His Son

The sinful heart is filled with "bitter jealousy and selfish ambition" (James 3:14), which causes hostility, quarrels and conflicts, even among those who are fellow members of the Body of Christ. This should not be so! Rather, God "opposes the proud" with His Law, in order to humble them unto repentance; He "gives grace to the humble," in order to exalt them by His Gospel of forgiveness (James 4:6–10). This true "wisdom from above" is found in the gentleness, mercy and peace of our Lord, Jesus Christ, who humbled Himself and sacrificed Himself for the salvation of sinners (James 3:17). He was "like a gentle lamb led to the slaughter," committing Himself to God, His Father, "who judges righteously, who tests the heart and the mind" (Jer. 11:19–20). Therefore, "after three days," His Father exalted Him by raising Him from the dead (Mark 9:31). In Holy Baptism, He takes disciples of all ages into His arms like little children. In receiving Him through repentance and faith in His forgiveness of sins, they receive from His Father a share in the glory of His cross and resurrection (Mark 9:36–37).

#### **EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST (Proper 21B)**

(26 September 2021) Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29 James 5:(1-12) 13-20 Mark 9:38-50 Christ Jesus, the Son of God, Cares for Us and Serves Us with the Forgiveness of Sins

When the people of Israel wept, complaining that they had no meat to eat (Num. 11:4), Moses cried out to the Lord that "the burden of all this people" was too heavy for him and that he was "not able to carry all this people alone" (Num. 11:11–14). So the Lord had Moses gather "seventy men of the elders of Israel" (Num. 11:16), and the Lord "took some of the Spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders" (Num. 11:25), so that Moses would not carry the burden alone. All who thus labor are honored, and all the people are cared for, in the name of the Lord (Mark 9:39–41). Everything is done with reference to Christ Jesus. So we cling to Him, and we flee from all sins that would separate us from Him (Mark 9:42–48). The life of the Church is one of repentant faith in Christ. Christians confess their sins to one another, and they "pray for one another," that each would be raised up and healed by the Lord Jesus, who covers "a multitude of sins" and saves our souls from death (James 5:15–20).

<u>CHANGES, THEY ARE A COMIN'</u> You may have seen some changes around the church lately. All of the stained-glass windows (made from German glass) are being removed so they can be serviced and put back. When the windows were originally made, a frame was made to surround the glass. Colored glass gets very hot and over time it expands enough that it no longer fits in the frame, which causes it to bow. (photo to the right) Each window sits in a solution for 24 hours so each piece can be taken apart. Once that is completed, the pieces are all put back together again. In addition to this, the giant, intricate stained glass of Jesus that Trinity owns (part of the original Trinity building) will be removed from that building, restored and safely put into storage.

The Covid-19 pandemic has caused a hardship for many in our community. As an example, the Tuesday's Table meal assistance has served 85-100 meals each Tuesday throughout the summer. This is an increase from the norm.





I am reaching out to you today to inform you of this year's decision on how we will conduct the Crop Hunger Walk. Due to the Covid-19/ Delta viruses we decided to not have the traditional Crop Hunger Walk. Due to a very high number of people with a critical need to eat, have shelter, or have clean water to use for their families we will be raising funds. We are asking the congregations of our local churches to give any amount they feel good about, knowing they will be helping people see God through the food they are saved with, the shelter that shields them from the harsh elements of nature, or violence, and danger. Having clean water provided to people that have none is a blessing from God that when we put our funds together can help with. The need for survival grew in unfathomable numbers due to the pandemic last year, but sadly we couldn't reach nearly all of them. So this year we will try different methods.

1. You can make a check out to CWS/Crophungerwalk and turn that into your church secretary. It will be picked up by Sheryl Pugmire (Walk Coordinator) or Bob Baer(Treasurer). Office secretaries please give one of us a phone call and we will be so happy to pick those up from you. Our phone numbers will be at the bottom of this email.

2. If people would like to give directly on the CROPHunger Walk website go to; <u>crophungerwalk.org/</u><u>winfieldks</u>. There you will read about our walk plans and see who has registered to walk on our chosen date of September 26, 2021. You may scroll down until you see where you can donate to one of the walkers registered. If you would like to register you may and then people can donate to you. You can set your own goal and ask your friends to donate to you. This could be a great challenge for some teenagers that may want to compete, or create teams. As of now Sheryl Pugmire is a registered walker. The safety is in walking around your block or wherever you feel comfortable, and not having to be around lots of people. You can have fun with your dog, kids, best friend or your horse!

3. Another way you could challenge one another socially to meet goals is on Facebook. You can video yourself walking on September 26, 2021 with a Crop Hunger Walk sticker, T-shirt, or a sign. The easiest way is Facebook live, using #EndHungerNow and #VirtualCROPHungerWalk.

4. If you would like to help and cannot do either of these options we could use Spirit Walkers which will pray for us out there raising funds and for those that need help.

5. Teachers, if you have a check for a donation please give one of us a call and we can make arrangements to pick that up to get it to the right people.

Attention!! All funds we raise 25% helps our own community!! The Food Pantry will receive 15%! Joseph's Storehouse in Burden which helps lots of local people as well will receive 10%!
